Dear friends,

As you probably know, I've spent this year writing my MA dissertation. I finished and submitted it last Friday, which is such a relief! I took the opportunity to include an 'Acknowledgements' section, which included the following:

"Thanks to the church communities of Ashby St Ledgers, Braunston, and Welton for releasing me to study and write, for their encouragement and support, and for singing with me."

My dissertation was on the spiritual significance of singing in Christianity. I mention this now because, at Ashby and Welton, we are resuming singing some of the parts of our Communion services that have been said for a number of years. I thought this would be a good opportunity to say a little something about it.

Have you ever noticed that singing in church is often a bit of a tricky issue? It can cause strong feelings, and rightly so because it is a very powerful thing. Part of my dissertation has been exploring more about what we can learn about it in the Bible. The second thing I've looked at is how the Church has handled this gift from God over the last two thousand years, and how we came to have a lot of different opinions about it – even divisions. The third part of my project was looking at how we might bridge the gap between what the Bible points to and the divisions we've ended up with, and how to have better discussions about it.

I know that returning to singing "Glory to God in the Highest" has filled many of you with joy. But for those of you who may be a little unsure, I'd just like to reassure you a little if I may. It's not about a polished performance or anything stuffy. Singing in church was turned into something elite in about the 4<sup>th</sup> Century AD, but the people of God have been singing Psalms and prayers for thousands of years. It does not belong to cathedrals or robed choirs; it belongs to all of us as the body of Christ.

In the Bible, it is assumed that praise is sung. The book of Hebrews 3:10-12 talks about Jesus leading all of us in sung worship to the Father. When the Reformation came along, things had gone wrong, and the reformers gave us back the prayers, but they didn't really know what to do with the singing anymore, partly because everything had become about words at that time.

Some people worry that singing the prayers is old-fashioned, or not welcoming to newcomers. It's great that we have a balance between traditional and modern worship. That helps us, which is great, but it's not really about us. It's about worshipping God, and singing is important. But drawing people to God is the Holy Spirit's role. Our role is to worship, to pray, and to join in with the action of God. When God inhabits our praises, what better time for visitors to encounter the risen Jesus? And we can't always anticipate how visitors will respond.

It might feel uncomfortable to some of us. Singing isn't as much a part of our culture as it once was, so we'll need to work through that. I am convinced that offering sung worship to God is an important and beneficial thing, and that this is taught in the Bible. If anyone would like to talk further about this, I'm very happy to. There's also a really good short series of "guided conversation" about music and worship in the Church that we could explore together if enough people tell me that would be helpful. And if you're *really* interested, I'd be happy to email my dissertation to you!
